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Alternate Between Guided Reading and Literature Study: Throughout the school year, middle school students should have a combination of small group reading experiences between guided reading (homogeneous groupings by level) and literature study (heterogeneous groupings with a grade-level text that will illicit rich discussion). The two different types of small group reading instruction compliment each other and give students different skills that they will need to grow as readers.

Guided reading helps students develop greater control over the reading process through the development of reading strategies which assist decoding and construct meaning. The teacher guides or 'scaffolds' their students as they read, talk and think their way through a text (Department of Education, 1997).
